

Lots of baby animals are born in the spring. Find out the names of these baby animals: duck, pig, sheep, cow, chicken and goose.



You could ask a grown-up to help you find the answers on the Internet or in a book.

Make a weather chart to show what the spring weather is like each day. Draw a picture of the weather each day for a week. You might even be able to write labels for the weather, using your fantastic phonic knowledge.



Lots of flowers grow in the Spring. Draw or paint a picture of a flower, looking closely at the details and trying to make it really realistic. What colours do you need?



Can you tell a grown-up about your flower picture? You could have a go at using an egg box to make daffodils.

Go with your grown up to the supermarket. Have a look at the fruit and vegetables. Can you name them? What colour are they? Can you find out how they grow? Which is your favourite?



Try growing some plants or flowers at home. Cress seeds grow quite quickly! Remember to give your seeds some water and put them somewhere sunny.



Go for a walk with a grown-up and look for signs of spring. Talk about what you can see. Can you spot any flowers growing? What is the weather like? Did you see any animals? You could take a photo or draw a picture of what you see on your spring walk.



Try making a model of a flower, fruit, vegetable or another plant. You could use modelling dough, paper or card, construction toys, empty cardboard tubes and boxes or plastic tubs and pots. Think about how you could make the stem, the flower and the leaves.

Read some books about plants and growing. They could be story books, poems or non-fiction books. Maybe you could take a trip to the library to see if they have books about plants!
